shortened parliamentary sitting year and the access and time afforded to us was greatly appreciated.

We presented 3 main issues:

1. Teacher training and preparation across Australia. We have been quite fortunate in SA to have a great quality Special Education undergraduate degree at Flinders University, however this will be ceasing in the future and they will only be offering a general teaching degree with only a few units on catering for students with special needs as they do in most other states and jurisdictions. The dwindling range of special education courses at universities and lack of

specialisation in these courses has caused a severe shortages of trained teachers with any special education experience.

2. The National Curriculum as it stands does not cater for all our students as many of our students are at the pre-foundational level i.e. pre Reception / year 1.

3. The health and wellbeing of our students, teachers, support staff and leaders in our schools and settings. The politicians are well aware of the Principal Health and Wellbeing Survey and that violence towards staff and leaders in special schools is 80% higher than in mainstream schools. We were very clear in expressing the day-to-day challenges and unsafe situations that our staff face every single day.

We were given a commitment to having a voice and ensuring that ongoing communication occurs with each of the chiefs of staff and advisors to both Dan Tehan and Tanya Plibersek. It was serendipitous that the next day Tanya Plibersek pledged \$30 million funding to students with a disability if Labour gained parliament.

Dear families,

I would like to take another opportunity to introduce myself as the Deputy Principal at ESEC. I am excited to be part of the ESEC community and I thank you for the warm welcome I have received.

On a personal note, my husband Peter and I have two daughters, Eilis and Caoilinn. Eilis is in her first year at university and Caoilinn has started year 11. Winston and Daisy, our pet dogs, are much loved members of our family. We are avid Port Adelaide supporters and I enjoy football banter as well as attending the games.

Part of my role as Deputy Principal is around Positive Behaviour Education Support. My work is based on the belief that "all behaviour is communication" and I will be working with staff and students to develop understanding and skills in:

- learning about what frustrates us, triggers us and pushes our button – this may be noise or movement or hunger
- what our behaviour looks like when we are frustrated or triggers -this may look like hiding, vocalising or screaming
- what happens to our body when we feel triggeredwe may sweat, our heart races or we may feel sick
- what cool down strategies help us to feel calmerwe might like listening to music, swinging on a hammock or blowing bubbles

Positive Behaviour Education Support helps us identify and name feelings and body signals so that we can recognise what our needs are and learn to meet the needs in positive ways.

On March 8 staff are participating in training to learn about the Keeping Safe: Child Protection Curriculum. The Keeping Safe: Child Protection Curriculum (KS:CPC) teaches children and young people to recognise abuse, tell a trusted adult, understand what is appropriate and inappropriate touching and ways to keep themselves safe. <u>March 8 is a Pupil Free Day.</u> I look forward to the opportunity to meet many more families and carers over the coming weeks.






M2 News


